Positive Behaviour Culture

A lot of changes were implemented last year to support improved behaviour and engagement across the school. This has included reviewing a number of policies. Students have risen to the increased expectations and the tone across the school this week has been positive and engaging.

EMUS: We continue to use our positive reinforcers, EMUS, to help all school members - students, staff, parents and community - to be Engaged, use our Manners, show Understanding and Strive. Each newsletter we will include the focus for the fortnight so that parents are able to use the language to reinforce the positive expectations at home as well as school.

Mobile Phones: As has been noted in various media, the most significant change is the introduction of a new Mobile Phone in Public Schools policy. This is a Department initiative and thus is mandated within all public schools. Mobile phone use is no longer permitted at school between school hours inclusive of recess and lunch. School Council Parent Nomination

Wagin DHS has a proactive and supportive School Council. This year there will be one parent position and one staff member position available. The role of a School Council Representative is to be the voice of the parent body.

We meet twice a term on a Tuesday afternoon 5.30-7.30pm. The role is ideally for a 3 year tenure 2020 - 2022. Next newsletter there will be a link to an online nomination form with a submission date of Friday, 28 February. The elected parent will be notified by 5 March and invited to attend a School Council Training session the following week. Student Leadership

Students will again this year have the opportunity to run for Student Council and Faction Captains. The Student Council will look slightly differently this year so please

keep reading to find out more.

Faction Captains: The nomination forms for Student Council will be available to students this Friday. A primary and secondary representative from each Faction is required.

Student Councillors: The nomination forms for Student Council will be available to students this Friday. Positions will be as follow: 2 x Year 6, 2 x Year 7, 2 x Year 8, 2 x Year 9, 2 x Year 10, 1 x Captain, 1 x Vice Captain. The nomination paperwork will require students to answer a few key questions and have a person over the age of 18 be an advocate for them. This is so that time out of class is acknowledged. The timeline will be as follows:

Week 1 Friday - nominations go out. Ms Pickering to speak to Year 6-10 students about expectations.

Week 2 Friday - nominations due in (no extensions).

Week 3 – Eligible nominees will present their speeches to their year group. Candidates for Captain will speak in front of the student body.

Week 4 – Elections to be held (Date yet to be confirmed)

Week 5/6 – Elected Factions Captains and Student Councillors to help at Swimming Carnival and Assemblies respectively.

Week 9 - Student Leaders Camp to Camp Kulin Monday, 30 March to Wednesday, 1 April. (A cost will be associated with this).

Students may apply for both positions. In the event that they win both Student Councillor and Faction Captain they will be asked to make a decision. The demands of each role will require students to be out of class at different times therefore holding two positions is not in a childs best interests academically. It also allows for wider spread student leadership.

What did you do at school today?

Moving beyond asking, "What did you do at school?" by Michael Grose. Ever found yourself asking your child the same bland question about school? "So, how was your day? What did you do at school today? What did you learn?"

If these are your default questions the chances are that you'll get a one or two word reply along the lines, "Fine!" "Good!" "Okay" "Nothing much."

These answers don't really tell you a lot. On the other hand, these types of questions don't ask a great deal. So how can you move beyond the mundane when you talk with kids about their school days?

The questions you ask to prompt a conversation will often say a great deal about you and what you value. If you focus only on academic or learning questions, then it indicates that's what you value. It helps to take conversations and your questions in different directions to get a multi-faceted window into your child's school life but also an indication of your child's interests, social skills and welfare. Here are some examples of question starters that may prompt different responses from kids about their time at school:

- 1. Tell me what made you laugh today?
- 2. Who did you play with at recess today?
- 3. Did you do anything that was brave?
- 4. If I spoke to your teacher, what would she tell me about you?
- 5. What did your teacher talk about today?
- 6. Is there anyone in your class who needs to be in time out?
- 7. Where's the best place to hang out/play at school?
- 8. Tell me one good thing that happened to you today?
- 9. Who were you nice/kind/friendly to today?
- 10. Did anyone push your buttons today?
- 11. What did you do that you were proud of/happy with today?
- 12. What's something you learned with a friend today?
- 13. What's your teacher's most important rule?
- 14. If today was a musical instrument what would it be? Why?
- 15. If you were a teacher tomorrow, what would you teach the class
